Last's Month Meeting Info

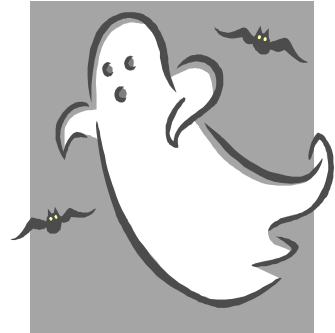


Due to the nature of this hunt no pictures can be published so I have placed this picture for your viewing enjoyment.

Brownie Trifle

1 (19 7/8 oz) package
fudge brownie mix

1/4 cup water

1/2 cup vegetable oil

2 eggs

1 tbsp dry instant coffee

1 package chocolate flavor
instant pudding and pie
filling mix

2 cups milk

1 (6 oz) package English
toffee bits(reserve 2 tbsp
for garnish)

3 1/4 cups whipped cream

20 servings

4 hours 30 min/ 4 hrs prep

1. Heat oven to 350F de-
grees.

2. Prepare brownie mix
as directed on package
for 13 x 9 in rectangu-
lar pan, using water,
oil, and eggs and stir-
ring coffee into batter.

3. Bake and cool as di-
rected.

4. Cut brownies into 1-
inch squares.

5. Place half of the
brownie squares in the
bottom of a 3-qt glass
bowl.

6. Prepare pudding mix
as directed on package
for pudding, Pour half
of the pudding over

brownies in bowl.

7. Top with half each of
the toffee bits and
whipped cream.

8. Repeat with remaining
brownies, pudding,
toffee bits and
whipped cream.

9. Sprinkle with reserved
toffee bits.

10. Cover and refrigerate



Myths, Folklore, Omens and Superstitions

While searching the internet this week trying to find ideas for an article, I kept coming across several sites listing the various superstitions people believe. Some of these are very old fashioned but some seem just as common today as they did many years ago. I couldn't possibly list all of them—it would take a multiple volume encyclopedia set to incorporate all of them, but here is a listing of some of the more common ones as well as ones I thought were interesting. See how many of these you have heard of—or how many you believe.

Superstitions & Bad Luck Omens

Black Cats— Black Cats have long been believed to be a supernatural omen since the witch hunts of the middle ages when cats were thought to be connected to evil. Since then, it is considered bad luck if a black cat crosses your path.

Broken Mirrors— An ancient myth our ancestors believed was that the image in the mirror is our actual soul. A broken mirror represented the soul being astray from your body. To break the spell of misfortune, you must wait seven hours (one for each year of bad luck) before picking up the broken pieces, and bury them outside in the moonlight.

Ladders— In the days before gallows, criminals were hung from the top rung of a ladder and their spirits were believed to linger underneath. Common folklore has it to be bad luck to walk beneath an open ladder and pass through the triangle of evil ghosts and spirits.

Owls— If an owl looks in your window or if you see one in the daylight bad luck and death will bestow you.

Salt— At one time salt was a rare commodity and thought to have magical powers. It was unfortunate to spill salt and said to foretell family disarray and death. To ward off bad luck, throw a pinch over your shoulder and all will be well.

Sparrows— Sparrows are thought to carry the souls of the dead and it is believed to bring bad luck if you kill one.

Unlucky Number #13— The fear of the number 13 is still common today, and avoided in many different ways. Some buildings still do not have an official 13th floor and many people avoid driving or going anywhere on Friday the 13th.

Thirteen is significant to Christians because it is the number of people who were present at the Last Supper (Jesus and his 12 apostles). Judas, the apostle who betrayed Jesus, was the 13th member of the party to arrive. Christians have traditionally been wary of Fridays because Jesus was crucified on a Friday. Additionally, some theologians hold that Adam and Eve ate from the forbidden fruit on a Friday, and that the Great Flood began on a Friday. In the past, many Christians would never begin any new project or trip on a Friday, fearing they would be doomed from the start.

Good Luck Superstitions

Horseshoes— To bring good luck, the horseshoe must be lost by a horse and be found by you, with the open end facing your way. You must hang it over the door with the open end up, so the good fortune doesn't spill out. Another origin of the "lucky horseshoe" is the belief that they ward off witches. Witches, it was once believed, were opposed to horses, which is why they rode brooms and pitchforks instead. By placing a horseshoe over a door, the witch would be reluctant to enter.

Four Leaf Clover— Clover is believed to protect humans and animals from evil spells and is thought to be good luck to find a four -leaf clover, particularly for the Irish.

Rabbit's Foot— These lucky charms are thought to ward off bad luck and bring good luck. You must carry the rabbit's foot on a chain around your neck, or in your left back pocket. The older it gets the more luck it brings.

Wishbones— Two people are to pull apart a dried breastbone of a turkey or chicken and the one who is left with the longer end will have their wish come true.

Common Myths & Folklore

- If the flame of a candle flickers and then turns blue, there's a spirit in the room.
- If a bird flies through your house, it indicates important news. If it can't get out, the news will be death.
- If you feel a chill up your spine, someone is walking on your future grave.
- A person born on Halloween will have the gift of communicating with the dead.

- A bat in the house is a sign of death.
- If a bird flies toward you, bad fortune is imminent.
- Crows are viewed as a bad luck omen, often foretelling death. If they caw, death is very near. Many Romans wore lucky charms and amulets to avert the "Evil Eye".
- A hat on a bed will bring bad luck.
- Eat an apple on Christmas Eve for good wealth the next year.
- The superstition of knocking on wood for good luck originates from pagan beliefs in regards to trees.
- Never take a broom with you when moving house– buy a new one.
- If your ear is burning, then someone is talking about you. To determine whether what they are saying is good or bad, remember this rhyme– Left for love, Right for spite.
- If the palm of your right hand is itchy, then it foretells that money is coming to you, but don't scratch it as that stops the money from coming. If it's your left palm then scratch away, as that means that you'll soon be paying out money.
- Dropping a pair of scissors is said to warn that a lover is unfaithful.
- To cut bread in an uneven manner is a sign that you have been telling lies.
- To cross two forks accidentally is a sign that slander will be spread about you. To drop a fork foretells the visit of a women friend. To stir anything with a fork is to stir up misfortune.
- The dropping of a knife foretells the visit of a man friend in the near future.
- If you give anyone an empty purse, he will never be blessed with riches. Place a coin inside for good luck.
- Dropping a spoon means that a child or young person is going to call on you. To cross a spoon over a fork presages happiness cut short by grief.
- People once believed the soul could escape from the body when a person sneezed. To stop this from happening, people ask God to bless and so to protect the person who sneezes.
- An itchy nose means your going to have a quarrel with someone.
- Spit on your hands for strength. This originated from seeing animals lick their wounds, making people think saliva had some magical healing power.
- Do not lean a broom against a bed. The evil spirits in the broom will cast a spell on the bed.
- If the first calf born during the winter is white, the winter will be a bad one.
- A cat onboard a ship is considered to bring luck.
- Evil spirits can't harm you when you stand inside a circle.
- Dropping an umbrella on the floor means there will be a murder in the house.
- If you bite your tongue while eating, it is because you have recently told a lie.
- If you sing before seven, you will cry before eleven.
- To dream of a lizard is a sign that you have a secret enemy.
- If you catch a falling leaf on the first day of autumn, you will not catch a cold all winter.
- A cricket in the house brings good luck.
- If the bottom of your right foot itches, you are going to take a trip
