Professor Researches Paranormal Media Effects on Viewing Public

Glenn Sparks picked a good time to start thinking about ghosts. With the increasing number of paranormal shows dotting the new season's TV line-up, public interest in the paranormal is steadily rising. Since the early 1990s, Sparks, a professor of communication, has been researching how the media affects the public's belief in the paranormal.

"I had done a number of studies early in my career on the effects of frightening movies on emotional reactions that children had. I was interested in the sorts of things that scared children in the media at different points in their development and what parents could do to help children who were scared," said Sparks.

Sparks noticed most of the programming, which caused the frightened reactions, were shows that involved ghosts, aliens and other similar

programming. Around the same time, Sparks noticed an increase in paranormal programming. "I've always been interested in how media affects what people believe. I just became interested in how (paranormal) depictions were being framed and what their effects might be on the viewing public," said Sparks.

Sparks said he has done about seven studies on the subject and is looking forward to starting his next project. Sparks' next research project will be studying ghosts, particularly how the media depicts ghosts and how that affects what people believe.

"Ghosts are very commonly represented in the media," said Sparks. "Ghosts and psychics are two that I would like to look at." He has found that a large percentage of the public admits to believing in ghosts or have not decided whether or not they believe in ghosts. He would also like to look at whether or not a person's prior belief in ghosts can predict the emotional reaction a person might have to a movie about ghosts.

"(Researching the paranormal) has opened up so many different realms of exploration," Sparks said. "As a

result, I've become familiar with a lot of the skeptical societies out there and their publications."

The magazine Sparks enjoys the most is the *Skeptical Inquirer*, which is published by the Committee for the Scientific Investigation of Claims of the Paranormal.

Benjamin Radford, managing editor of the *Skeptical Inquirer*, said the paranormal stories the media present is just a reflection of what the public is interested in.

"The amount someone believes in the paranormal more or less goes up and down," said Radford.

"Paranormal shows have always stayed around because there is always an interest in what's out there."

Sparks hopes his research will help to advance theory and understanding about media effects on the public. He thinks the research could help to sensitize people to their own beliefs about the world and the role media plays in helping to influence those beliefs.

"It is important to be able to evaluate evidence for or against a claim as students," said Sparks. "As a culture, if we're not able to discriminate between what's true and false we're in trouble."



6) Baby Ghost, Queensland Australia, 1947

Mrs. Andrew captured this apparition while taking a picture of her 17 yr.-old daughter's grave. She remembers that she was alone that day and doesn't even recognize the child in the picture. Notice the image of the child is transparent.



7) Tulip Staircase Ghost, Greenwich, England, 1966

While visiting the National Maritime Museum, Rev. Ralph Hardy caught this apparition on film as he photographed the beautiful "Tulip Spiral Staircase" located in the Queen's House section of the museum.



8) Girl on Grave, Bachelor's Grove, Chicago, 1991

Taken by Ghost Research Society member Jude Huff-Felz, this photo shows a young lady dressed in period clothing sitting on a tombstone. The photo was taken (using an infrared camera) when some unusual things were occurring in that area.



9) Back Seat Ghost, 1959

While visiting the grave of her deceased mother, Mrs. Mabel Chinnery snapped this picture of her husband as he waited in the car alone? It appears that Mabel's mother may have tired of the cemetery and was hitching a ride home.

10) Ghost in the Loft, St. Botolph's Church, London, 1982

Taken by Chris Brackley, this photograph shows a figure in period clothing high up in the church's loft glaring down below.

High-Speed Camera May Serve Dual Purpose

Snapping 5,000 frames per second, a high-speed camera has captured the best images ever of elusive sprites, flashes of light associated with intense thunderstorms.

The findings, published by Steven Cummer of Duke University and his team in a recent online edition of Geophysical Research Letters, show how sprites develop.

They could also help scientists get a better handle on the chemical make-up of the upper atmosphere, a region that is too high to analyze with planes and too low for satellites.

"They substantially improved the time resolution of the observation of sprite events," said Victor Pasko, associate professor of electrical engineering at the Pennsylvania State University.

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"That immediately brought some very interesting results in comparison to previous studies," said Pasko, who is not involved in the research. To date, the fastest images ever taken of sprites have been at a speed of 1,000 frames per second. From those and previous studies, scientists had some insights into these so-called transient luminous events that burst and fade out faster than the blink of a human eye.
